## YOUTH & ALUMNI Programs by IFCA and its Partners Achievements and Impact 2017

#### February 2017

The Japan Alumni Team had their annual retreat in Tokyo, setting new goals and objectives for the new year. They also had their first Strategic Sharing Workshop in Tokyo.

Added 4 new US and 5 new Japan members.

#### **March 2017**

US board members and an alumnus traveled to Japan and participated in events held in Fuji City, Kyoto, Kita Kyushu, Fukuoka, and Tokyo.

#### June 2017

 Miho went to Fukuoka City to speak to a 15-community and youth member group about the possibility of creating an IFCA Youth and Alumni group in the area.

## YOUTH & ALUMNI Items for 2018 Program Goals Discussion

- **E**valuations have been inconsistent. Therefore, it is hard to estimate and understand our impact.
- •Goals of the US Team are unclear, causing role confusion and low motivation for some members.
- •How do we diversify geographically and why are we doing this?
- ■From 2013 to 2018, IFCA conducted 16 programs abroad that included many relevant and important activities. (US to Japan = 5 times, Japan to US = 4 times, March US Team's Trip to Japan = 3 times, December 2017 Trip to Japan, plus, London, Buenos Aires and Calgary) We also published several youth project related publications. Many speeches and blogs were written by alumni members in both countries. What impact did we really make? What is the next step?
- •March 2018 marks the fifth anniversary of IFCA's Youth Project. How should we celebrate our achievements?

#### **CAREGIVERS**

#### **Achievements and Impact 2017**

- •<u>First half of the year</u>: Published the first volume of the MFM Manual in Japanese language. Visited stakeholders in cities and wards that showed interest in this model. (Kawasaki, Chiba, Setagaya, Yokohama, Shizuoka, etc.) Some problems with committee members. Attendance was low in monthly meetings, etc.
- Second half of the year: Held 5 Study Sessions in Tokyo. People participated in these sessions from all over Japan.
- No evaluations. However, when Dr. Izumi spoke at a foster parenting event in Tokyo in December 2017, it seemed that many people were familiar with MFM.
- **Pending Grant Applications** x 5 ranging from \$30,000 to \$60,000
  - Interpreter's traveling cost and salary (50,000 yen x 5 days)
  - Participant's lodging and food, plus domestic transportation?
- In 2018 we would like to design a Japan MFM logo, and to publish the Vol. 2 of the manual (Budget \$2,000 in Japan)



### Tentative Goals and Items for 2018 Program Goals Discussion

- The new TF-CBT learning website started with renewed contents on 1/1/2018. IFCA received permission from the website developer to build a Japanese version of this new TF-CBT learning website. Miyako and her associates have already translated the contents of the older TF-CBT learning website. Miyako would like IFCA to build and run a new Japan TF-CBT Network website that has this translated learning page. That means that IFCA will become the centralized registry of all TF-CBT trainees in Japan collaborating with the US developers. Miyako will be covering this project's cost by a grant or by her own fundraising efforts.
- In June 2018, David Hong (TF-CBT trainer) will be traveling to Sapporo and perhaps Tokyo to provide advanced training. This will be a joint program between the Chinese Government and IFCA. (David went to China in May 2017 when he was already in Japan with IFCA's finance. In 2018, China will be agreeing to pay for David's trip to China, and IFCA's financial responsibility is to cover the cost of his travel between China and Japan.)
- Miyako is now one of 7 certified TF-CBT trainers in Japan. She will be conducting a series of workshops in 2018. (February Hakodate, March Tokyo, etc.) She would like to split the profit of each workshop between her research center and IFCA. I suggested that IFCA pay set fees to Miyako as a trainer.
- Branding and funding problems continue. IFCA sponsored TF-CBT trained 400 clinicians in Japan. However, very few people know about IFCA and its effort to disseminate this trauma treatment method in Japan. What should we do about that?
- Japanese national institutions and government would have to recognize IFCA's achievements in TF-CBT dissemination.
