The WSDN was established on 21st of January, 2008, Kobe, Japan. The purpose of WSDN is to contribute to the health and welfare of people through promotion of international academic exchanges and collaborative research of disaster nursing, and systematization of disaster nursing knowledge and practice. As well, we are seeing that disaster nursing knowledge is being systematized so as to enable the sharing and application of such knowledge.

The historical moment has come for disaster nursing in the world. This Research Conference is being organized by the Japan Society of Disaster Nursing (JSDN), and Dr. Hiroko Minami, President of University of KinDai Himeji, is appointed as the Chairperson of this Conference. In recent years, the world has experienced many disasters, such as a new influenza pandemic, earthquakes and floods. Given such uncertain circumstances, I am grateful for Dr. Minami's bold decision and strong leadership in relation with JSDN for holding this conference. I anticipate her happiness with JSDN and Conference organizers.

The main theme of the conference is "Disaster knows no border: Human bonding". It is my sincere hope that participants in the first International Nursing Research Conference will pursue new knowledge and new relationships, thereby contributing to the further development of disaster nursing.

Dear Colleagues and Friends;

It is my honor and pleasure to host the First Research Conference of World Society of Disaster Nursing in Kobe, Japan from Jan. 9 and 10, 2010 which is held under the auspices of the Japan Society of Disaster Nursing.

The World Society of Disaster Nursing (WSDN) was inaugurated on January 22, 2008 in Kobe, the founding members comprising 40 organizations from seven countries (Japan, China, Korea, United Kingdom, Thailand, Indonesia and the United States). WSDN aims to contribute to the health and welfare of people through promotion of international academic exchanges and collaborative research of disaster nursing, and systematization of disaster nursing knowledge and practice.

Disasters occur everyday somewhere in the world with dramatic impact on individuals, families and communities. World Disaster Report 2007 reported a 60% increase in disasters in the last decade over the previous decade. According to the United Nation's Bureau of Crisis Prevention and Recovery, some 75% of the world's population live in areas that have been affected at least once by either an earthquake, a tropical cyclone, flooding or drought between 1980 and 2000(IRIN, 2007).

Under such background, the 1st Research Conference of World Society of Disaster Nursing offers keynotes, informational and educational lectures, and symposium as well as oral / poster sessions and other unique programs. The experiences of nurses in the affected sites will be shared internationally and interdisciplinary. The knowledge of disaster nursing which has been accumulated through the lessons learned from the painful and difficult experiences of catastrophes in different parts of the world will be presented. Citizens in Kobe and its neighbor will be participating to listen to nurse colleagues. Various disaster nursing networks will be shared to stimulate further network development as well as the possibility of international collaboration will be discussed.

Kobe is blessed with various attractive sightseeing resources such as rich natural environments with the mountains, inland sea, exotic townscapes, and hot springs.

On behalf of the Organizing Committee of the conference, I cordially invite you to this special occasion and look forward to seeing you in Kobe, Japan.

Dear Friends:

On behalf of the members of the Japan Society of Disaster Nursing, the host organization of the 1st International Research Conference of the World Society of Disaster Nursing, I wish to welcome you to this groundbreaking meeting with a hearty yokoso!

We are gathered here for these short days, in large part, because of the memory of the 6,434 people killed by the Great Hanshin-Awaji Earthquake that struck the Kobe area at 5:46 am on January 17, 1995. This unanticipated disaster, which also left over 300,000 homeless, caused many people to wake up to the importance of disaster nursing. Over the next few years, a small group of nurses formed the Japan Society of Disaster Nursing. We held our first meeting in Kobe in 1998 and we have held annual conferences since. To date, our membership has increased to nearly 1000.

The members of the Japan Society of Disaster Nursing have focused on producing knowledge about disaster nursing, systematizing disaster nursing practice, and contributing to prevention, preparation and recovery of life and health. Over the first few years, we started compiling information about disaster nursing practice and analysis of activities. Simultaneously, we started working on prevention and preparation. Then, we were shocked once again in 2004 when the people of Niigata Prefecture were struck by the Chuetsu Earthquake. That same year, many people throughout Asia woke up to the importance of disaster nursing when the Indian Ocean Tsunami killed hundreds of thousands.

These events pushed us to form an exploratory committee to establish an international society of disaster nursing with initial partners in China, Korea and the United Kingdom. On January 22, 2008, 40 organizations from Japan, China, Korea, the United Kingdom, Thailand, Indonesia and the United States founded the World Society of Disaster Nursing in Kobe and elected Dr. Hiroko Minami to be the chief director of this first conference. Later in 2008, once again, with the earthquake in Sichuan, China, we witnessed the importance of nurses responding to people's needs in disasters.

In cooperation with member organizations and all of you, at this inaugural conference, we hope to build an international research and support network to strengthen the capacity of nurses throughout the world to prevent, prepare for, and respond to disasters. We expect that appropriate education and training about disaster nursing will be essential to make disaster nursing effective. We also hope to focus attention on building appropriate response systems, and to promoting long-term physical and psychological nursing support for disaster victims and for disaster nurses themselves.

Welcome to Kobe, the prefectural capital of Hyogo.

I am delighted that the 1st Research Conference of World Society of Disaster Nursing is being held here in Kobe on such a large scale, with the participation of many people from around the world.

It has now been almost 15 years since the Great Hanshin-Awaji Earthquake. Having experienced the earthquake, we rediscovered the importance of being prepared for disaster. I think it is our duty as quake victims to share with the rest of the world the experiences and lessons we learned from the earthquake, and help minimize the damage caused by disasters.

During the reconstruction process, the Hyogo Prefectural Government not only helped local residents rebuild their lives and strived to establish a more disaster-resistant community, it also provided to the world the lessons learned, and delivered support to disaster-stricken areas, mainly through the Disaster Reduction and Human Renovation Institution, in collaboration with relevant international organizations.

Such efforts have also been made in many other areas, such as disaster nursing. In 1998, the Japan Society of Disaster Nursing was established. Its aim is to organize for future use empirical knowledge gained during the post-earthquake period, such as emergency medical care in disaster situations, health care in temporary shelters, and mid-and-long term mental healthcare. Since its founding, the organization has researched disaster nursing, established an educational program and provided emergency medical care through practical application of research results.

Moreover, during the community's recovery process, the Hyogo Nursing Association launched the "Machi-no-Hokenshitsu" program, a community healthcare consultation program, which plays important roles in supporting elderly persons and child-rearing families through healthcare consultation, even in ordinary times.

In 2008, the World Society of Disaster Nursing was established to connect nursing professionals around the world with each other, which was really impressive. The chair of this conference, Dr. Hiroko Minami, and many other people have worked hard to develop the science of disaster nursing and establish a worldwide network of nursing professionals. I hope they will make further contributions in their fields.

Disasters will always happen. However, we can minimize the damage they cause by sharing our global wealth of experience and wisdom. Pandemic H1N1 influenza now requires collaborative efforts by countries around the world.

I hope that the 1st Research Conference, held under the leadership of Dr. Minami, will enable participants to share the latest research results and information on various activities, and will further accelerate efforts to protect people's lives, health and day-to-day living.

そして、昨年には、世界の看護職の皆様をつなぐ「世界災害看護学会」が誕生しました。本当に素晴らしいことです。災害看護学の発展、ネットワークの構築にご尽力いただいた南大会長をはじめ関係の皆様、さらなるご活躍を期待します。

災害はなくせません。しかし、人々の経験と叡智を集めることで、被害を最小限に抑えることはできます。今、世界規模で流行する新型インフルエンザでも、各国の連携した取り組みが求められています。
